

Veterans in Registered Apprenticeship

Are you a transitioning service member or veteran looking for a new career opportunity? Registered Apprenticeship is a unique and rewarding pathway to developing in-demand workplace and technical skills while earning a paycheck in the career of your dreams from day one.

Registered Apprenticeship is an industry-driven, high-quality career pathway through which employers can develop and prepare their future workforce, and individuals can obtain paid work experience with a mentor, receive progressive wage increases, classroom instruction, and a portable, nationally-recognized credential. Registered Apprenticeships are industry-vetted and approved by the U.S. Department of Labor or a State Apprenticeship Agency.



USE YOUR POST-9/11 GI BILL® WHILE COMPLETING YOUR APPRENTICESHIP

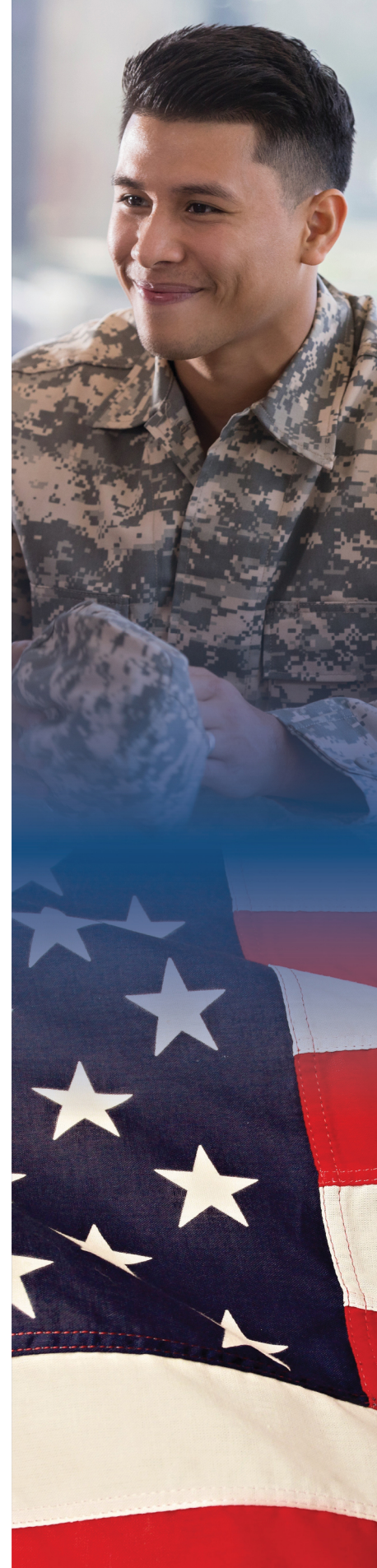
Eligible veterans pursuing training through a Registered Apprenticeship program approved by a U.S. Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) State Approving Agency for education benefits can receive their GI Bill monthly housing allowance (MHA) in addition to their apprenticeship wages. The MHA

issued will be a percentage of the U.S. Department of Defense Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH) for an E-5 with dependents based on the location of the training. Visit the [U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs website](#) to see the relevant rates.

Additionally, Post-9/11 GI Bill recipients are eligible to receive up to \$83 per month for books and supplies. Veterans already participating in a Registered Apprenticeship program at the time of application may be eligible to receive up to 12 months of a retroactive MHA and supplies stipend.

VETERAN READINESS AND EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

Veterans with a service-connected disability may also be eligible for custom Registered Apprenticeship programs approved by a Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) counselor. There are a number of Registered Apprenticeship opportunities that are accessible for veterans with a variety of service-connected disabilities. Apply for VR&E benefits to determine whether you are eligible by filling out VA Form 28-1900 for VR&E benefits, available on eBenefits.va.gov. Details about these custom Registered Apprenticeship programs are provided below.

- ▶ Any employer may host a program where a VR&E counselor prepares a specific training plan to ensure that the participant is working toward the full skills of that occupation.
- ▶ You will be paid Registered Apprenticeship wages by the employer and can receive a monthly subsistence allowance.
- ▶ VR&E benefits typically last from six months to 24 months.
