Australia welcome Wales to Allianz Stadium, Sydney, for the first of their two-Test summer series as rugby’s summer internationals get fully underway.

It is an important series for both teams who will be eager to develop after their recent poor performances.

Wales smashed Australia 40-6 at last year’s Rugby World Cup, but the Aussies are now under new management, with former Ireland boss Joe Schmidt their head coach.

Australia Rugby hasn't beaten a Northern Hemisphere team Down Under in more than two years as the Wallabies try to climb out of a rut the national team has found itself in since the end of 2022.

And that climbing could start against a Wales team that is focused on the future as the Wallabies host Wales at 5:40 a.m. EST on July 6 at Allianz Stadium in Moore Park, Australia. That match is streaming live on FloRugby and the FloSports app. Replays will also be available on both platforms.

The match will be the first under new coach Joe Schmidt, who has named a new-look side for the clash.

Liam Wright has been announced as the new skipper, with seven debutants included in the squad to face Wales.

The Wallabies will next play Wales on July 6 (AEST) at Allianz Stadium

It will be the first game of the two-Test series, with the action heading to Melbourne's AAMI Park next week.

This will be followed by a standalone Test with Wales in Sydney on July 20.
